
#### We live in a time of great division, especially on social issues...

# "Give Me Your Tired, Your Poor..."

As the Fourth of July approaches, my heart, as a naturalized U.S. citizen, is filled with gratitude. I often recall my naturalization ceremony, which took place in federal court in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, 15 years ago. That moment remains etched in my memory as one of profound joy and thanksgiving. Today, I'd like to share a few reflections on America as a nation shaped by refugees and immigrants.

My first reflection comes from a recent trip to New Orleans for the 2025 Gulf Coast Synod Assembly. On the evening of May 16, I took a walk along the Riverfront and came across a striking sculpture—an immigrant family of four on one side, and on the other, Lady Liberty looking out over the mighty Mississippi River, a powerful symbol of hope and freedom. I was

deeply moved by the inscription:

"Dedicated to the courageous men and women who left their homeland, seeking freedom, opportunity, and a better life in a new country."

Standing before the monument, I felt humbled and blessed to be one of the millions who have journeyed to the United States in search of a better future. It meant a lot to see the reason behind my own journey so clearly and beautifully affirmed.

My second reflection centers on the Statue of Liberty. In 2018, my family and I visited this iconic monument in New York City—a symbol that had captured my imagination and inspired my American dream long before I arrived in the U.S. nearly 28 years ago as a graduate student. It was at the base of Lady Liberty that I first read Emma Lazarus's famous poem, "The New Colossus," and was profoundly moved:

Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!



Later, I learned that Emma Lazarus (1849-1887) was an accomplished poet with deep Jewish spirituality. According to the official Statue of Liberty website, her work as an aide for Jewish immigrants detained by Castle Garden officials profoundly impacted her writing, particularly the plight of the Russian Jews she encountered.

Today, when I reread these words of Emma Lazarus, I am reminded of another Jewish voice—that of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. As an infant, Jesus and His family fled to Egypt as refugees. In His final parable recorded in the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus says: "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." (Matthew 25:34–36) As Christians, we are called by Christ to care for the vulnerable, the poor, and the stranger, to welcome those seeking refuge, freedom, and a new beginning.

This leads to my third reflection—a question: Will America continue to welcome refugees and immigrants from around the world? Will the moral vision rooted in the Judeo-Christian tradition continue to inspire our nation to be a beacon of hope for those whose hopes are being denied in their homelands?

Finally, my heart turns to Global Refuge (formerly known as Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) and other refugee resettlement agencies. They have been on our congregation's prayer list for months. Let us continue to lift them up, asking our Lord and Savior to be with them and strengthen them as they tirelessly work to resettle those displaced by war, persecution, and natural disaster—both here in the United States and around the world. May God bless them as they face the challenges of our time and carry out their God-given mission. Let us also continue to pray for our brothers and sisters of St. James Lutheran/Santiago Apostol and other immigrant congregations in our synod and across the country. May God watch over them and grant them peace, safety and strength.

May God bless America, and may we continue to be a light for those seeking hope and refuge.

# Welcoming the Voice of Change: A Summer of Renewal in Our Worship Life

As we enter the summer season, our culture embraces longer days with scorching heat, humidity, and plenty of time for relaxation. Spiritually speaking, summer is a time when creation reminds us that change is always moving, reshaping, inviting.

This summer, we are embracing a simple but powerful spiritual principle: *change is the first and final voice we should always welcome.* 

At the very beginning of scripture, we read that God spoke creation into being; that first voice is the voice of movement — separating light from darkness, waters from land, calling

life into places of despair. Continuing in our reading of scripture, we are promised "a new heaven and a new earth" — a final voice of change that gathers all things into God's renewing love.

Change, then, is not something we resist or fear but rather, something we welcome, knowing that God is already there, preparing the way ahead.

What does this mean for us as a community?

This summer, we are adopting a **wholistic** and **thematic** approach to living as a worshipping community.

• **Wholistic**: Emphasizes integration of the full human experience; Body, Mind, Spirit, Heart - not merely an intellectual assent but a complete adherence to the dynamism of the interior life.

• Thematic: Allows us to expand our worship pragmatically so that we can connect our church community with

members of the local community, including local artists, community organizations, and much more. We will begin by focusing on Creation Care with the "Season of Creation" an ecumenical time of the year when many Christian communities spend a month praying and discerning how they want to protect creation.

You might ask: Why change something that's familiar? Namely, the familiar can be a gift, but it can also become a comfort zone that no longer stretches us. Welcoming change is one of the surest ways to stay awake to God's



surprises. Change reminds us that faith is a journey, not a fixed place.

In his book *Life Together*, Dietrich Bonhoeffer reminds us, "The Christian cannot simply take for granted the privilege of living among other Christians." This is especially true when we gather in worship: it is a privilege, a gift, to let God shape us anew so let us not take it for granted.

Together, let us practice the holy art of welcoming the new, knowing that it is in the movement of change that we meet the living God.

# **Hurricane Preparedness - 72 Hour Lutheran**

Hurricane season is from **June 1 through November 30**. We may not be as prepared as we need to be. We encourage each and every one of you to become a **72 Hour Lutheran**, a person who has enough supplies in their home to meet their household's basic needs for **72** hours.

- Discuss the type of hazards that could affect your family. Know your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding, and wind. Locate a safe room or the safest areas in your home for each hurricane hazard. In certain circumstances, the safest areas may not be your home but within your community.
- Create a disaster supply kit
  - Proper identification
  - ° Immunization records
  - ° Medicines, Prescriptions
  - ° Waterproof bag for important documents and items
  - ° Flashlight/Batteries
  - ° Battery operated and NOAA weather radio
  - ° Fully charged cellphone, charger, power bank, etc.
  - Access to a traditional (non-wireless) landline phone, in your home or at a nearby trusted location.
  - ° Cash (with small bills)
  - Extra keys
  - ° Tools keep a set with you during the storm
  - ° Vehicle fuel tank (kept filled)
  - ° Pet care items, including drinking water
- Make a plan now for what to do with your pets if you need to evacuate.
- Call the church and make sure that they have all your information.

- Stock up on non-perishable emergency supplies
  - One gallon of water per person per day
  - ° Snack foods
  - Cooking tools
  - BBQ, camp stove, or other method of heating food
  - ° Non-electric can opener
  - Fuel, oil for generators, chainsaws, etc.
  - Paper plates and plastic utensils
  - ° First-aid kit
  - ° Toiletries, hygiene items, moist wipes
  - Weather & news apps downloaded to devices
  - Bug repellant
  - Duct tape
  - ° Tarps
- If necessary, determine an escape route from your home and designate places to meet. (Note: these should be measured in tens of miles, rather than hundreds of miles.) Have an out-of-state friend as a family contact so all your family members have a single point of contact.
