Grading Rubric

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This activity can be evaluated at least four ways:

- 1. After the activity, the class discusses some of the features of a good presentation. Students volunteer some of the things their classmates did well (e.g. "Cassandra related the material to us." "Fred really caught my attention with his introduction.")
- 2. We also discuss what students did well during their presentations from a delivery perspective (e.g., extemporaneous approach, vocal variety, natural gestures, effective eye contact, intentional movement, and other non-verbal behaviors).
- 3. Students spend a few minutes writing a reflection of their Twitter Talk on notecards. Students report gaining confidence, learning by watching their classmates, understanding how much preparation is required, and valuing the opportunity to reflect as group.
- 4. I leave five minutes at the end of class for students that would like to receive personalized feedback from me. Students get in a line, and I tell them individually something they did well, one thing they should consider working on prior to their graded presentation, and how long they spoke.
