BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH EXCHANGE (20 POINTS)

The objective of this task is for you to write a professional bio sketch that introduces you to the class. A bio sketch is often used by professionals to project a desirable image to an audience. It may be used to introduce you at an interview, before a presentation, or on a website. A bio sketch often includes information found in a resume, as well as personal information not placed on a resume.

Bio Sketch Preparation and Feedback


- A. Read the web article "How to Write a Professional Biography for a College Student" and also online for examples of corporate bios, especially of people in your field or career interest. What themes and images do these individuals project? Which ones would you emulate?
- B. **Recall your experiences** (both good and challenging) from work, home, school, and community. How have such encounters shaped you? Which one best depicts you? What bits of information do you want to use for your bio sketch? Anything you include in your bio must have a purpose, lesson or value—readers must see a connection to the overall theme of you bio sketch.
- C. Write the one-page bio sketch which should consist of three paragraphs, block-style, singlespace, 185-200 words. Use third-person style and complete sentences. Place the word count at the end of the third paragraph. Use 14-point Calibri font for each paragraph. Put your name above the paragraphs in 32-point, bold, uppercase font. Place a space between your name and the first paragraph, and between paragraphs.
- D. Add a professional portrait photo—a clear, sharp, black & white upper body photo. Grainy photographs will not do, neither photos enlarged and cropped from other photos with someone else's body part or clothing showing. Photos should be 2.5" (wide) x 3.5" (vertical/long). Center the photograph above your name.
- E. Laser-print your bio sketch on a letter-size sheet. It should be clear, crisp, and clean with no smudges. Set one-inch margins on all sides of the sheet. Secure your sheet in a thick envelope or folder—no folded or crumpled sheets. Save a copy in your email or a USB drive and bring a hard copy to class on *Thursday, 23 January.*
- F. On the day of the exchange, you will display your bio sketch for everyone to read, and then you will read your teammates' bios and give them feedback based on the following:
 - What most impressed you most about the bio sketch? Why?
 - How would you improve your bio sketch?
