- 6. Did you like Celeste's relationship with Lee? Do you have a relationship like that in your life?
- 7. How did you feel about Lee's relationship with her children and step-children?
- 8. Lee has a love / hate relationship with New York City. Do you feel that way about your city?
- 9. Is the ending satisfying?
- 10. How do you think Lee's point of view is similar or different from the author's background?
- 11. If you could ask the author a question, what would you ask?
- 12. Would you recommend this book to a friend? Why or why not?
- 13. Is misogyny still a problem today?
