ANGELA HANSCOM

Angela Hanscom is an occupational therapist specializing in nature interventions, and the author of the popular book <u>Balanced</u> <u>and Barefoot</u>. Her work in child development at TimberNook center in New Hampshire is influencing healthcare, education and communities across the world.

PANELIST - ROCIO VILLALOBOS

Rocío Villalobos is a Xicana Indigenous woman and a native Austinite whose transnational childhood shaped her understanding of community, family, migration, inequities, and borders. Rocío's entry into social justice movement work began when she was a first-year college student at the University of Texas at Austin. Her involvement with a grassroots environmental justice organization based in East Austin transformed the way she saw herself and the role she wanted to play in her community - one of an advocate, an agitator, and a mentor to young people.

Rocío received her B.S. in Applied Learning and Development and M.A. in Curriculum and Instruction with a specialization in Cultural Studies in Education from the University of Texas at Austin. For over 15 years, Rocío has been involved in social justice movement work in Austin, covering education, immigration, and the outdoors/environment. She currently serves as the Immigrant Affairs Manager at the City of Austin's Equity Office. Rocío volunteers her time as a board member with Youth Rise Texas and Ecology Action of Texas, and as a Mentor with Explore Austin. She brings a commitment to equity and joy in her personal and professional life.

PANELIST - ALEX BAILEY

As a child, Alex remembers the fresh smell of mint leaves in his grandfather's garden. His grandfather's intimate love of the natural world is always inspiring to connect to the world around them. This familial connection to the outdoors always inspired him to connect deeply with nature, particularly in life's hardest moments. This foundational love and connection to nature led him to envision a program which radically transforms outdoor spaces and programming to be a beacon of joy and liberation for Black youth--- later to be known as Black Outside, Inc. Between 2018 and 2019, founder Alex Bailey embarked on a journey to observe and shadow summer camps and outdoor programs across the country to better understand the impact outdoor programming has on youth. He took those learnings and, alongside an amazing community of people, began building a culturally relevant program in the city of San Antonio which today collectively serves 150+ youth across central Texas. Alex is a proud fellow of Wild Gift, Echoing Green, a 2019 TedxSan Antonio speaker, and currently serves as the Board President for Black Outside. Inc.



During this workshop, educators will learn practical gardening skills and explore evidence of the academic, physical, and mental benefits of working in a living laboratory with students as they explore important science concepts.



 - Presenter: Adam Flores
 - Not planning for culture & climate can result in an organization with a fragmented culture, where groups of people develop their own norms and practices from their observations, and assumptions. The result can frequently be high turnover, or worse, a decline in organizational success. Presenters will review the key areas that leaders should focus on in planning for healthy and inclusive organizational cultures. From there, participants will have the opportunity to pick one or two areas where they see a need for clarity within their organization to begin tackling. We'll spend time working in small teams on a consultancy protocol in which participants will share their focus with tablemates and receive feedback on possible ways to proceed.
