1. Bike Share and Urban Greenways to Promote Access to Nature

Texas A&M University

Despite the amazing benefits of exposure to nature, many urban dwellers spend little time in nature. Riding a bicycle is an excellent way to get out into nature, to actively commute, and to accumulate the benefits of physical activity, however confidence and practice with bicycling often starts at a young age. Barriers such as bike ownership, physical fitness, and safety from traffic keep people from biking. Using pedal assisted electric bike share bikes (e-bikes) on an urban trail system can help to overcome all these barriers.

In this hands-on workshop, participants will join a free group bicycle ride on the Houston Bayou-Greenways trails using e-bikes supplied by Houston BCycle. Participants will actively explore the Greenways and consider the promotion of urban bicycling to expose children (and adults) to nature. Health and Nature researchers from Texas A&M University, Drs. Jay Maddock and Deb Kellstedt, joined by Laura Knutson and Tony Banks of Houston BCycle will discuss safety, bikeability, and facets of the trail at several water and rest breaks along the way in addition to highlighting differences between cycling for transport or recreation.

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3. Engaging New Audiences through Camping Adventures

You're invited to the campout! Learn one method to create environmental stewards through meaningful outdoor recreation. Join Ranger Lisa Jeane at nearby Sam Houston Park to have fun, share your love of nature, help us connect families and youth to nature. Learn about the Texas Outdoor Family program, Texas State Parks outreach programs, and a train-the-trainer model for effectively welcoming new audiences to the power of nature experiences.

Be ready for an afternoon spent learning about setting up a campsite (building a tent, using a stove), Leave No Trace principles, Jr. Ranger games (like Ranger Names, Tree ID, and Micro-hikes), and outdoor cooking hacks. You will also leave with some insider tips on enjoying your Texas State Parks and finding those ultimate camping adventures anytime of the year. Logistics: Be prepared to be outdoors, dress for the weather (synthetic layers are great), bring water, and expect to be active (short 5 min walk, and group games.)

Take a guided walk along beautiful Buffalo Bayou to explore, learn, and experience the profound mental and physical health benefits of nature, movement, and connection. Following the walk there will be an informational discussion with tips and guidelines for creating successful community walking programs for children and adults. Laura Conely with Urban Paths will share strategies and resources and answer questions both during the Wellness Walk and the workshop. The Wellness Walk will be approximately 3 miles along accessible park trails in Buffalo Bayou Park. The group will then gather on the Buffalo Bayou Partnership Visitors Center Terrace for discussion and workshop.

In this workshop, Texas Parks and Wildlife staff will cover the importance of fishing as it relates to the conservation of our natural resources, the barriers, and benefits of fishing for all members of the community and walk you through some of the activities and lessons taught during our Angler Education workshops, which will include Fish ID, Knot Tying, Backyard Bass and more!

This will incorporate hands-on activities, classroom learning, program resources, information about how to become an Angler Education Instructor, and a trip to the nearby park to practice casting and learn about fish habitats. You will go home with tangible ways to include fishing in your programming as another way to connect children and families to nature.

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6. Health and Wildlife Out Your Back Door: Optimizing health for people and ecosystems

Join Memorial Park Conservancy to explore the interplay between nature and human well-being. Have you ever wondered how nature supports not only birds, bees, and trees but also ourselves? Have you experienced the transformative power of stepping outside and feeling your mood uplifted?

Participants are invited for a tour of the newly opened Kinder Land Bridge and Cyvia and Melvyn Wolff Prairie, to experience the interconnectedness that binds people and ecosystems. Immerse yourself in the tranquility of the prairie and discover the educational and interactive aspects that have been built into the landscape.

Participants will have the opportunity to learn about interactive programming techniques that can be implemented in their own educational environments and discover tools that community members can engage in to promote science both internally and externally.

7. In the Forest or on the Playground: A Case Study of Nature Play at The Fay School

The Fay School is a 300-student school serving children from 3 years old to fifth grade and educates through hands-on, project and place-based learning, utilizing the whole campus to make lessons come alive for students. The Fay School recently renovated their outdoor space from traditional play structures to a natural playscape with the ingenuity and expertise of Bienenstock Playgrounds. This created a natural gateway between the formal schoolyard to the bayou beyond.

In this field session, attendees will learn about the programs the Fay School offers, how nature play facilitates developmental milestones, how places of mastery were created, and the site-specific process from funding to construction. Participants will have the opportunity to learn about our preschool's forest mornings and how we utilize our spaces with elementary-aged students. This session will be led by staff members from the Fay School and Bienenstock Playgrounds.

The workshop covers a range of topics, starting with an exploration of the crucial role of pollinators and the significance of creating wildlife habitats. It then delves into strategies for designing gardens that attract and support pollinators and wildlife, regardless of space limitations. These tactics can be applied not only in schools but also libraries, parks, and other public areas. Topics will include plant selection, creating diverse habitats, and providing food, water, and shelter. The workshop also highlights the importance of citizen science in conservation efforts, bringing children and families closer to nature. Throughout the program, participants will receive curated resources including ongoing community science projects, organizations that certify garden spaces, plant selection, and other related materials.

Participants will also visit the Cockrell Butterfly Center, their outdoor demonstration gardens, and the rooftop greenhouses to see some of the covered topics in action. By the end of the workshop, attendees will be empowered with the knowledge, skills, and inspiration to transform their own spaces into sanctuaries for pollinators and wildlife, while actively supporting their communities to engage with nature and science.

Libraries are recognized as a trusted source of information and entertainment, but library resources and services can go well beyond books and story time programs. Join staff from San Antonio Public Library and Austin Parks & Recreation Department to hear how they are each approaching a Nature Smart Libraries strategy. Presenters will share how the Cities Connecting Children to Nature (CCCN) initiative can be leveraged to bring different city departments, local non-profits, and other partners together, and how a library/park relationship can evolve from a one-sided use of outdoor space to a true exchange between departments. Come learn about how nature-based programs can blend both library and park goals, from Story Walks to Take & Create kits, to State Park Pass programs, and experience new ways of bringing literacy outdoors in your community.

12. School of the Future: Building a Wildly Healthy, Climate Ready School and Campus

The many benefits of connecting children to nature at their schools and schoolyards are well known, if not yet fully acted upon. Yet, we are also living in a time of rapidly accelerating climate change, biodiversity loss, and nature inequity. How can we respond? The Jefferson Early Learning Center, in Alief ISD, is a living laboratory for trying a new paradigm by using most of the campus as resilience infrastructure, wildlife habitat, and a nature park. The campus sports 4.5 acres of restored prairie wetlands and is building towards planting 200+ trees. Its interior was built to be biophilic, incorporating natural elements, organic shapes, nature imagery, and lots of natural light. In short, this is an example of the future schools we need tomorrow, built today. The Jefferson Early Learning Center in Alief ISD stands as a remarkable testament to the possibilities of integrating nature, resilience, and equity into educational spaces, fostering a more sustainable and inclusive future for all.

From this workshop participants will understand how naturalistic elements can be incorporated into school design, learn about the challenges, techniques, and promise of creating campus-sized ecological restorations, and will lastly understand how to activate large schoolyard greening for educators.

What to Wear: Wear comfortable clothing, including sneakers or hiking boots. We will be outdoors for part of this workshop, hiking and conducting a short tree planting exercise. Also, please bring a reusable bottle and consider downloading the iNaturalist and/or Merlin apps if possible.

13. SPARK School Park Tour – Exploring Two Green Schoolyards

Join SPARK School Park Program and other collaborators to explore two Houston ISD SPARK Parks - Travis and Davila Elementary Schools. The first school on the tour is Travis Elementary where we will learn about the SPARK School Park Program, its history, and current initiatives. Participants will hear from landscape architects who have been working with SPARK Committees (consisting of both school and community members) to design each of the parks, as well as school representatives and community members.

The public art components of the sites are a key ingredient for students to actively participate and they will be discussed at each school. As gardens often complement outdoor play spaces, participants will also visit these schools' Monarch Heroes gardens; initiated by the National Wildlife Federation's Monarch Heroes pollinator garden grant program. A tour of these outdoor classroom spaces is included, and everyone will hear about the

student, teacher, and community involvement in both the design and creation of these areas that support native wildlife. At Davila Elementary, Urban Harvest will share about their school garden program. Additionally, the organization Families in Nature who is working with both communities to provide self-driven programming opportunities for exploring nature in the SPARK parks will be there to explain their role in the program. Each of these parks is representative of the SPARK School Park Program which is celebrating its 40th year in 2023!
