

LET'S LERN ABOUT THE ACTORS . . .



LET'S LEARN ABOUT THE SHOW ...

School House Rock Live follows Tom, a nerve-racked school teacher who is nervous about his first day of teaching. He tries to relax by watching TV when various characters representing facets of his personality emerge from the set and show him how to win his students over with imagination and music!

School House Rock Live is based on the original TV series which was the brainchild of an advertising executive who

LET'S LEARN ABOUT VOCABULARTY IN THE SHOW ...

Grammar

Noun - a word or group of words that refers to a person, place, or thing.

Pronoun – a word that takes the place of a noun or noun phrase in a sentence.

Verb – a word that represents an action or state of being.

Adjective – a part of speech that describes a noun or pronoun.



Conjunction – a word that joins words or groups of words together. ("and," "but," and "or")

Interjection – a word or phrase expressing emotion, usually one word in length and used with an exclamation.

Math

Count – add up to determine the total number

Multiply – adding a number to itself a certain number of times.

Pattern – an arrangement of repeated parts, following a rule or rules.

Science

Circulation – the continuous movement of blood through the heart and vessels.

Galaxy – any of numerous large-scale collections of stars, gas, and dust that make up a visible universe.

Planet – large celestial bodies that are smaller than stars and do not produce their own light.

Social Studies

Congress – the legislative body of the United States responsible for making the laws of our country.

Bill – a draft of a new law that is being suggested. Lawmakers vote on it before it becomes a law.

U.S. Constitution – the fundamental law of the United States.

Preamble – the introductory statement of the U.S. Constitution.

19th Amendment – amendment to the U.S. Constitution giving women the right to vote in 1920.

Suffrage – the right to vote in a political election.

LET'S LEARN ABOUT THEATER ETIQUETTE ...

As a member of the audience, you play an important part in the success of a theatrical performance!

Attending a live theater performance is different than watching TV at home or a movie in a movie theater. Since it is a live performance, it cannot be stopped or restarted.

We want you to enjoy your time in the audience. Here are a few rules to follow:



- Do not talk, whisper, or sing during the performance unless encouraged by the actors on stage.
- Keep feet on the floor, not on the seats.
- Performers appreciate enthusiastic applause, but not whistling or shouting.
- Please do not take photos or video.
- Please turn off all cellphones and electronic devices.

LET'S LEARN ABOUT THE PEOPLE WORKING BEHIND THE SCENES . . .

It takes many talented people to produce a show. Live theater is all about collaboration and teamwork! Here are some of the people who work in the theater:

Playwright – creates the story, characters, and action.

Director – provides the vision of how a show should be presented, works with the actors on their roles, develops the blocking, and is in charge of the rehearsals.

Choreographer – creates dances and arranges movements for a musical.



Stage Manager – runs the show from opening curtain to closing curtain and is in charge of everything on stage and backstage.

Light Designer – designs the lighting for a show and programs all of the lighting effects.

Set Designer – designs the sets for a show and builds the sets.

Costumer Designer – designs, collects, builds, and organizes the costumes for a show.

Props Master – designs, collects, builds, and organizes the props for a show.
