# Doxycycline

## What is doxycycline used to treat?

Doxycycline is a generic drug for Vibramycin<sup>®</sup>. It is a broad-spectrum antibiotic that is used to treat a wide variety of infections including those carried by ticks

such as tick-borne disease, heartworm disease, and periodontal (teeth and gum) disease and these are more common in cats than dogs.

### What are the side effects of doxycycline on cats or dogs?

The most common side effects include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, and appetite loss, and some of these signs may be reduced by giving the medication with food.

If you suspect any side effects, overdose, or an adverse reaction to doxycycline, call your vet office immediately or <u>A.S.P.C.A.'s Animal Poison Control Center</u> at 888.426.4435. A change in dose or medication may be warranted based on the determination of the veterinarian.

### How do I know if I need doxycycline to treat my cat or dog?

Cats are usually affected more than dogs. Some signs of infection that can be displayed in your pet include the following:

- Dogs: reduced appetite, depression, and a mild fever.
- Cats: high fever, swollen lymph nodes, nasal discharge, and possibly abscesses at the site of the tick bite.

### Where can I get doxycycline to treat my cat or dog?

Doxycycline can be obtained at a veterinary clinic or compounding pharmacy. You will need a valid prescription from your veterinarian if you plan to fill the medication at the pharmacy.
