

DES (diethylstilbestrol)

What does DES (diethylstilbestrol) use to treat?

DES (diethylstilbestrol) is a generic drug for Boestrol®. It is a hormonal agent and a synthetic estrogen that is used to treat urinary incontinence and other diseases responsive to estrogen in both dogs and cats. Also, it can be used to treat some types of cancers in both male and female dogs.

What are the side effects of DES (diethylstilbestrol) on cats or dogs?

Side effects may include mild vaginal spotting, fever, bleeding, bruising, bloody diarrhea, vaginal discharge, vomiting, lethargy, and bone marrow suppression which can be displayed in your pet with the following signs: anemia, low platelet counts, and low white blood cell counts. If you suspect any side effects, overdose, or an adverse reaction to DES (diethylstilbestrol), call your vet office immediately or [A.S.P.C.A.'s Animal Poison Control Center](#) at 888.426.4435. A change in dose or medication may be warranted based on the determination of the veterinarian

How do I know if I need DES (diethylstilbestrol) to treat my cat or dog?

Some signs of urinary incontinence that can be displayed in your pet include the following: involuntarily losing control of their bladder, pooling or spotting of urine underneath your pet when sleeping or relaxed

Where can I get DES (diethylstilbestrol) to treat my cat or dog?

DES (diethylstilbestrol) can be obtained at a veterinary clinic or compounding pharmacy. You will need a valid prescription from your veterinarian if you plan to fill the medication at the pharmacy.
